

Kristine grew up in Cedar Grove, WI, and attended church in nearby Oostburg, a Dutch enclave south of She-

boygan. People lived with a mutual duty to each other. "You don't put yourself above others, you don't show off." At the age of twelve following VBS, Kristine made a personal decision to be a Christian. Following Jesus made sense then, and she has been faithful to that decision ever since.

Her dad passed away when she was a college freshman, compelling her to study at the local two year UW campus, but she eventually left town and graduated from Coe College in Iowa with a degree in music education. After two years of teaching in WI, she joined the Presbyterian Mission program and taught in Egypt for three years. She met husband, Bob, after returning to the states. They moved to Marshfield in 1988 to teach in the public schools, and joined FPC as a matter of course. Their kids, Paul, Steven, and Sarah were all born and raised here.

Music and faith are closely related for Kristine. We are all loved unconditionally by God, but we must reflect that love in mutual duty to one another. In music, accolades are not deserved just for showing up, but earned through a commitment to discipline. The dancing

allows emotions to be expressed without words. Touching in the dance provides the physical connection that everybody needs. And missed steps bring no judgment at all, only friendly laughter.

Not long after joining the dance club, Chris and Sharon decided to shop for a church they could attend together. After visiting several churches that were not all that friendly, they experienced the FPC welcome and knew they had found something special. Going back to the dawn of recorded history, humans have sought ways to quiet their minds and focus their attention. As religions developed, spiritual practices were incorporated into stories and structures. Focused walking is one of the spirituality techniques. Guest Contributor A structure that facilitates mindful walking is a labyrinth.

In our current definitions, a distinction is made between labyrinths and mazes. A labyrinth has one defined path from the beginning to the center. There are no dead ends; you cannot get lost or stuck.



The labyrinth was installed in 2004 on the west side of the FPC property. It was constructed with many helping hands, wheelbarrows, and shovels in memory of Sharon Groff. Sharon completed her life of 48 years in 2003 due to breast cancer. A threefold spiritual path:

Cleansing [Purgation]

Walk in. With each step, let go of what blocks us in life from God. Repeat a phrase of scripture or a prayer, asking for healing for oneself or another.

Rest [Illumination]

When you get to the center, find a place to rest in God, a time for insights, clear-seeing, openness, receptivity to whatever God may bring to you—a word, sensation, feeling, image or sense of rest and calm. Experience of forgiveness and of forgiving. Sit, lay down, or walk in the center's circle, staying in the center as long as desired or needed.

Taking on [Union]

Walk out. Experience a sending forth, commiting to a specific act in one's life ahead, taking on peacemaking and justice seeking as a frame for the days ahead.

There are many ways to walk the labyrinth. Children often enjoy running through the arcs and turns. More meditative approaches can also be taken. The walk can be focused on the present moment with a releasing of past and future thoughts.




Marshfield Area Habitat for Humanity — 2022 Build
